

Grow Group Discussion Questions

A grow group is 8-16 people who get together weekly to study God's word and the previous Sunday's message. There is a time of discussion, support, encouragement, and learning how the message applies to daily life. *PCC uses the ESV* (*English Standard Version*).

Point #1

- a) Read John 9:13-16. Explain the two opinions that were formed when they heard about Jesus healing a blind man.
- b) In what way did these opinions impact the ability to work through an argument? How does Point #1 relate?
- c) Why will asking questions be a big part of stepping into Point #1? How does this challenge or encourage you?

Point #2

- a) Read John 9:17-25. How did the Pharisees try to distract away from the miraculous healing? Why?
- b) How did the blind man respond? What does this highlight about the truth of Point #2? Why is this important?
- c) In what way has today's culture departed from Point #2? What has been the result? How can you protect yourself?

Daily Devotions

These are provided for mid-week personal spiritual growth. Prayerfully writing out your answers will help you experience real life transformation as you dig deeper into the spiritual truths of God's word and today's message.

MONDAY // Read John 9:13-16, 5:1-9, 15-16

- Why do you think Jesus chose to perform both healings on the Sabbath? How did the Pharisees respond?
- In what way did their perspective impact their ability to acknowledge God and both healings?
- How did this ultimately impact their ability to communicate in a redemptive way? What does this teach you?

TUESDAY // Read John 3:1-2, 7:40-44, 9:13-16

- Explain the two different perspectives the Pharisees had regarding the healing of the blind man.
- What does this reveal about the two different premises that led the discussion? (i.e., argument vs. learning)
- In what way did Nicodemus reflect a "learner"? What was the result? How does this encourage you?

WEDNESDAY // Read John 9:13-16, Exodus 20:8-11, Matthew 10:9-13

- Using your own words, explain what it entailed in order to obey the Sabbath based on Exodus 20:8-11.
- Given the Pharisees had hundreds of rules to obey the Sabbath, what does that imply about opinion vs. fact?
- How will confusing the two promote arguments, limiting redemptive conversations? How can you fall into this trap?

THURSDAY // Read John 9:17-18, 7:40, 4:19

- What did the blind man and woman at the well have in common when it came to their understanding about Jesus?
- How did the Pharisees respond to the blind man's perspective? What does this reveal about a willingness to learn?
- In what way do you think their agenda impacted their ability to listen? What does this teach you about listening?

FRIDAY // Read John 9:18-23

- Why were the blind man's parents hesitant engaging in a discussion with the Pharisees? How did they lie?
- In what way did the Pharisees approach to the conversation epitomize the bases for all arguments? Be specific.
- Describe how you're recently engaged in this type of conversation and how it could be avoided in the future.

SATURDAY // Read John 9:24-25, Matthew 5:37, James 5:12

- How did the Pharisees try to distract the blind man from the miracle healing that had taken place?
- How did the blind man respond? In what way did he deflect the distraction? Be specific.
- What does this highlight about sticking to the facts in an argument? What has been your experience with this truth?
